

however, you will need to take different factors into consideration beforehand.




Some of the factors you will need to consider are face and head shape.


You need to take into consideration head and face shape when plaiting and twisting hair. You do not want to give the client a style that emphasises their imperfections but need to identify how a style can work with their shape.


For example, a client who has a long narrow head and face shape would suit a style with volume or bulk at the sides. Facial features also need to be considered; for example, a fringe will make a high forehead appear shorter.








For you to grow and develop your knowledge and work in the hairdressing industry, it is vital that you know how to analyse the client's hair and understanding the structure and their functions.

Tick the correct techniques to maintain good posture when working:
Stand with feet together \Box
Back straight
Stand with feet slightly apart
Move around the client to avoid leaning
Bend shoulders forward

Stretch up to reach the client.
